

## 2154 Private *Daniel Barrow*

**Barkerman** Grand Falls Paper Mill(wage \$40.00 per mo.)

**Enlisted:** February 23, 1916, age 24 years

**Parents:** Job and Sarah Ann Barrow, Greenspond, Bonavista Bay, Nfld.

**Religion:** Methodist

**Description:**

- Height: 5ft. 6.5in.
- Range of Chest Expansion 4.5 in.
- Needed 3 teeth extracted

**Service:**

- Embarked St. John's S.S. Sicilian, March 24, 1916 for United Kingdom
- Joined Regiment in France, July 21, 1916
- Killed in action, September 15, 1916, Parents were informed of Private Barrow's death by Rev. E.C. French, Methodist Minister, Greenspond, September 26, 1916

**Burial:** Vlamertinghe Military Cemetery, Reference IV, D.6, Vlamertinghe France

**Special Note:** Because Pt. Barrow' father, Job Barrow, suffered from "senility and stomach troubles", his ability to make a living was somewhat impaired. Thus the contribution made to the family's income by Daniel, both while working at the papermill, and later as a soldier, was significant. After Daniel's death, Mrs. Barrow applied for a government pension or separation allowance. Unfortunately, her request was refused on the grounds that despite senility and stomach problems, "[her] husband is not totally incapacitated, and you are not totally dependant upon your son, Daniel" (letter to Mrs. Barrow, May 12, 1920

On February 14, 1920, Mrs. Barrow forwarded this letter of loyalty to the authorities. Incidentally, this was before she was refused separation allowances on May 6, 1920
